Family Story Time: Join us as we read books and sing songs. Every Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday. Also, the first Saturday of the month.

Insectarium by AZ Science Center: Discover characteristics of insects as you observe live critters, “see” like a bug and build a terrarium.

I Love You Rituals: We are going to learn about I Love You Rituals. Dr. Bailey’s “I Love You” rituals are used to strengthen relationships, build trust and more. Have I enticed you yet?? Come, attend and be part of the beauty of the I Love You Rituals, they can be tailored to you and your family.

Bags of Groceries: Is your little one excited to read? We are going to explore with labels and signs. Children will learn that sign tells everyone something, or this label represents their favorite snack! They will focus on skills like letter and number recognition, sight words, and more!

Magnetic Painting: Can you paint with magnets? Yes, you can. If you are looking for hands-on activity to make learning about magnets fun and exciting for your child, then you are in the right place!! We are going to use a magnetic bar, horseshoe or wand pull the objects through the paint and around the surface of the paper using magnetism!

Parents Chat: Recognizing and Managing Stress: Stressed out? Need to talk??? Everyone experiences stress. Learning what causes or triggers your stress and what coping techniques work for you, can help reduce your anxiety and improve your daily life.

Alphabet Soup: Want to get your child excited about learning letters? This alphabet soup early literacy activity is the perfect way to engage and motivate even your most reluctant little learners!

Parents Workshop-Kith & Kin (Spanish): The Kith and Kin program empowers caregivers with tools to encourage healthy development for children. Participants will receive free training, support, school readiness materials, and safety equipment.

Parents Group: Spanish Reading Mommies: Let’s boost language development. Literacy in Spanish for moms who want to learn how to read to their child. We will learn new vocabulary, discussion questions and activities connected to the book. 8 families participated.

I am Thinking on a Shape: Looking for some fun and fresh ideas for learn geometry concepts? Try our game! We are going to challenge your children and explore each shape, identify real world objects containing the shape and then put their new knowledge to the test by finding shapes and describing the number of edges, vertices and faces.

Parents Chat: PAX Tools-Protective Factors: PAX Tools is a group of strategies that are used to develop self-regulation and build and restore peace in the home. Adults will also benefit by feeling less stress through incorporating these strategies.

Moon Sand: If you are looking for sensory activities for your little explorer, check out our Moon Sand activity. We are going to make a soft, moldable sand that will provide hours of sensory play to your child.

Swimmy: We are going to read the book Swimmy. We will learn to recognize how we feel, giving those emotions a name, and owning our body language and facial expressions. When reading the book, children will understand that we are all on an emotional rollercoaster each day. We will navigate the emotional highs and lows and give confidence and independence to even the youngest learners.

Autonomous Vehicle Service Provides a Sustainable Way to Phoenix Sky Harbor



If you're interested in a hassle-free and sustainable way to get to Phoenix Sky Harbor International Airport, you may want to consider catching a ride using Waymo's fully autonomous vehicle service.

Rides are available 24 hours, seven days a week in Waymo's fully electric Jaguar I-PACE equipped with the fifth generation Waymo Driver. Pickups and drop-offs occur at the 24th St. PHX Sky Train[®] Station, as well as the 44th Street PHX Sky Train[®] Station where travelers can hop on the free PHX Sky Train[®] and quickly get to Terminals 3 or 4. Trains arrive and depart every few minutes.

Reserving a ride to use the service is easy. You simply download the Waymo One app and start riding.

You may recall that the service launched in December when Phoenix Mayor Kate Gallego arrived at the 44th Street and Washington PHX Sky Train[®] Station via a Waymo vehicle.

This set a global milestone as PHX became the first airport in the world to offer travelers the ability to take a Waymo autonomous vehicle as a means of transportation to and from the airport.

At the time of the launch, Waymo announced that it doubled the Waymo One service area in Downtown Phoenix. The expansion connects the airport service to a large swath of the downtown area, offering safe and convenient mobility options to Phoenicians and travelers alike.

Last November, Waymo began offering its Trusted Tester participants the opportunity to take autonomous rides to and from downtown Phoenix and the airport with an autonomous specialist in the vehicle. Waymo has removed the autonomous specialist from the vehicle, and anyone can hail a Waymo to ride between the airport and downtown Phoenix.

This new service comes two years after Waymo opened its fully autonomous commercial ride-hailing service, Waymo One, to the public in the East Valley of Phoenix; and it builds on the company's strong partnership with the City of Phoenix.

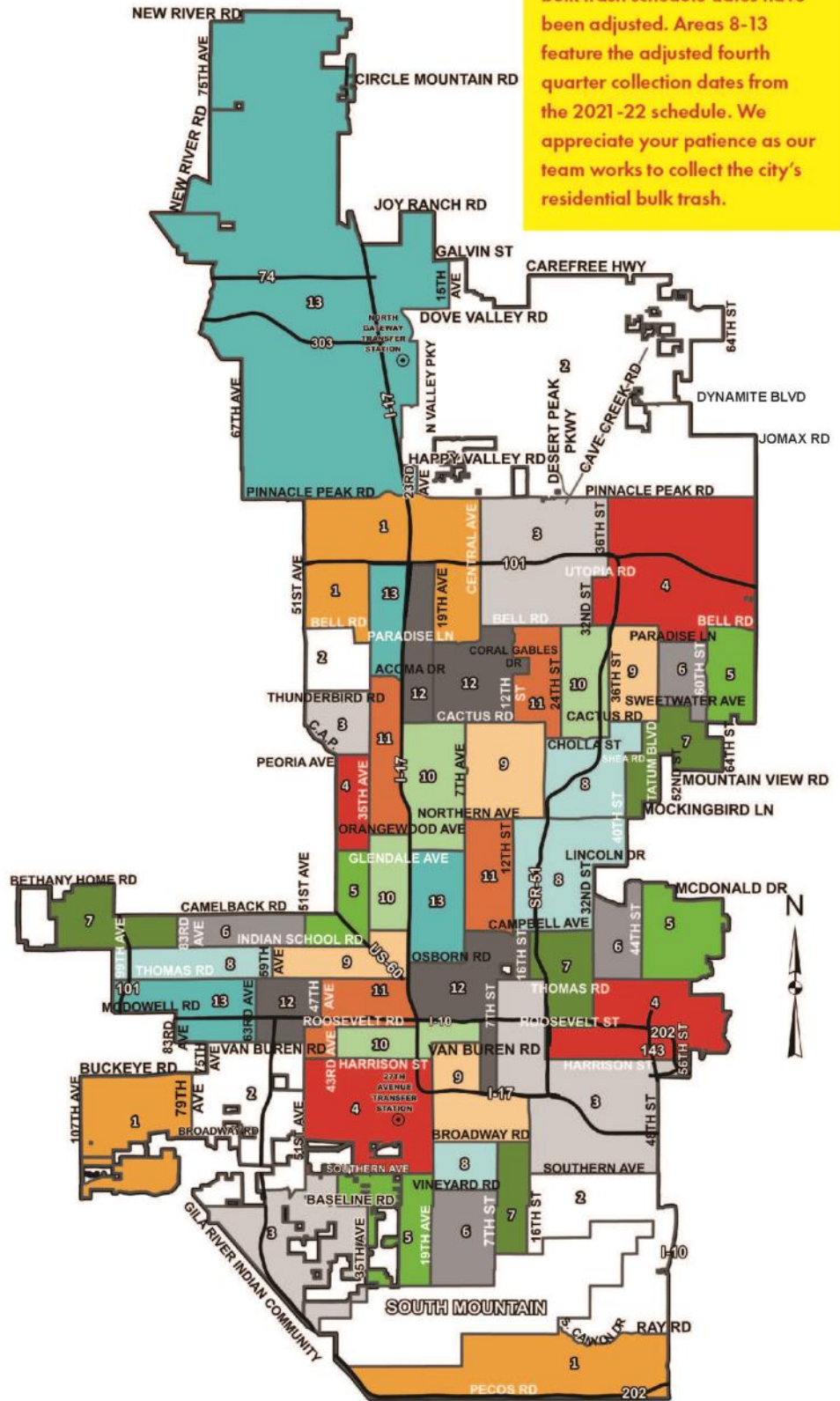

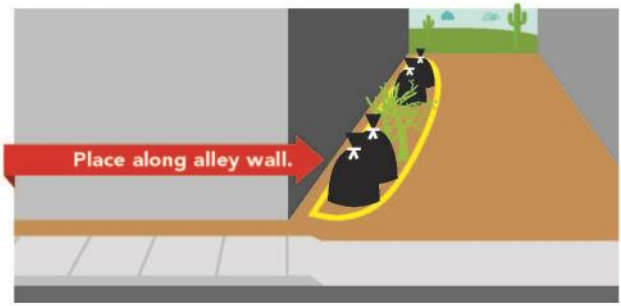
BULK TRASH PLACEMENT

If you have curbside collection, crews will only pick up piles placed close to the edge of the property. Crews can only reach up to 5 feet onto your property. Do not place piles near fixed objects.



Do not place piles on top of water meters.

If you have alley collection, place pile in the alley along your property line only. Avoid touching wall and blocking alley access.

- ✓ Place broken down cardboard in your recycle container.

DON'T INCLUDE:

- ✗ More than 20 cubic yards in your pile, which is similar to the size of a SUV.
- ✗ More than 25 pounds of construction and/or demolition waste.
- ✗ Household hazardous waste (HHW), such as antifreeze, pool chemicals, oil, batteries and paint.
- ✗ Tires, any shape or size.
- ✗ Appliances that use refrigerants.
